Paul's testimony from Acts 20:22-24 (NIV)

And now, compelled by the Spirit, I am going to Jerusalem, not knowing what will happen to me there. I only know that in every city the Holy Spirit warns me that prison and hardships are facing me. However, I consider my life worth nothing to me, if only I man finish the race and complete the task the Lord Jesus has given me; my only aim is to finish the race and complete the task the Lord Jesus has given me the task of testifying to the good news of God's grace.

How often has God warned you, like he did Paul, that life-threatening troubles were coming? My answer: rarely. Perhaps because I personally serve God's mission while living in the West, where homeland ministry often proves easier than global ministry.

I hope Paul's words offer perspective that life isn't as bad for Christians in the U.S. as it is for Christ-followers serving God in places that are antagonistic to the Gospel.

The day is coming, however, when Western believers will face hardships like Paul's. As we prepare for those times, let us take heart and remember five necessities:

- 1. Obey the call to go ("And now, compelled by the Spirit").
- 2. Step forward in faith ("not knowing what will happen to me there").
- 3. Listen for the Holy Spirit's voice ("the Holy Spirit warns me").
- 4. Finish well ("my only aim is to finish the race and complete the task").
- Commit to being a testimony of the grace of God at work in your life ("the task of testifying to the good news of God's grace").

We hope that as you engage with this devotional, it will inspire a greater connection with God's mission in your local community and across the world. One Mission Society (OMS) Church Partners, on behalf of OMS, is pleased to offer this resource to our partnering churches. Our mission is to form healthy partnerships with local churches to grow missional engagement and advance global disciple-making movements. One New Humanity

Ephesians 3:8-10 (NRSV)

... this grace was given to me to bring to the Gentiles the news of the boundless riches of Christ, and to make everyone see what is the plan of the mystery hidden for ages in God who created all things; so that through the church the wisdom of God in its rich variety might now be made known to the rulers and authorities in the heavenly places.

What is the greatest witness to hostile spiritual powers that they have been defeated and, one day, their total demise will occur? Remarkably, the very existence of the church as a multiracial, multicultural, united new humanity (Eph. 3:10) serves as this ultimate witness. Here, it is not so much what the church does but rather who it is (Eph. 2:11–22).

This does not mean the erasure of racial, cultural, or linguistic differences. Paul still speaks of Jews and Gentiles; and, on the day of Pentecost, Jews each heard the apostles' message in their own language (Acts 2:6). But in a world divided by factions, parties, tribes, and interest groups, the surprising, supernatural unity of the church, partnered with its diversity, proclaims to the powers of darkness that their end has come. It remains a testimony of the cosmic unity in Christ, which is God's final purpose for all things (Eph. 1:10). We long to see more people become disciple-makers as a united church of many peoples, cultures, and languages. The church's interracial, intercultural nature testifies to the transforming power of the Gospel.



The Valley of the Shadow

Psalm 23:4

Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil, for you are with me; your rod and your staff, they comfort me.

Missionaries can have bad days. Sometimes, those bad days stretch into a bad week or even a bad month. We start to doubt our effectiveness, our kids act out, or we feel tired of being away from family. How can we share Jesus and his hope with others when we feel as though we're walking through a valley?

Call and Response

Isaiah 6:8

Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, "Whom shall I send? And who will go for us?" And I said, "Here I am! Send me."

Your phone rings. You see it's a number you don't recognize. Thinking it's probably a telemarketer, you ignore it. Moments later, your phone rings again. This time, you see it's your boss. Waiting until the third or fourth ring, you answer with a hesitant, "Hello?" Later, you get yet another phone call and see it's your spouse or your best friend. You immediately answer with a cheerful, "Hey!"

Our response to a phone call typically reflects the relationship we have with that person. So ... what if we received a call from God? How would we respond?

In Isaiah 6, we see the call and response of the prophet Isaiah. When God asks, "Who will go?" Isaiah does not hesitate to respond. He wholeheartedly says, "Here I am! Send me."

The Hebrew word used here is *hineni*, which means "Here I am." But it's much more than that. It's a posture of the heart that expresses a total readiness to give of ourselves. It's an offer of complete availability and surrender to whatever God is asking, often before we fully know what will be asked of us.

God's call to partner with him and his work around the world looks different for each of us. Some he may call to serve overseas as missionaries. Some he may call to serve on short-term mission trips or in local cities. Others he may call to give financially toward supporting missions.

Regardless of what God calls us to, what matters most is the posture of our hearts when we answer.

When God calls, how will you respond?

Here I Am, Lord!

During my sophomore year at university, I began attending Bible study groups regularly. Since I was a brand-new Christian, I had never actually read the Bible. The stories of love and redemption fascinated me but none more so than the ones about people making themselves available to God, despite their inefficiencies. I, too, wanted to say yes to serving God. But how?

I studied journalism. What could I do for the kingdom?

One night, while reading the Word, I felt God's whisper telling me to consider Isaiah 6:8. Honestly, at that time I didn't even know where to find Isaiah. So, I used the index and found the verse.

I decided then and there that I would serve in missions somehow, somewhere, and my life mantra would be, "Here I am, send me!" I never looked back.

Hearing God's still small voice that night marks the start of my journey. Campus fellowship groups, student mission conferences, and a graduate degree in missions helped pave the way.

Since then, I have served on 3 mission fields and visited more than a dozen countries in the past 30 years. I am so glad I had ears to hear. God." God's presence and power seemed to electrify the control room. "Father, is someone's heart responding?" I prayed. Would we ever know?

On Monday morning, Gaudin asked why the Saturday night newscast was delayed. My heart pounded while I explained. Smiling, he responded, "'Mary Magdalene,' our mystery listener for whom we've been praying, just called to thank me for my strong words Saturday night. You know she doesn't listen to the 11:00 news but turns on the radio at 11:15 for the music. She heard the announcement and wanted us to know that she went to church Sunday for the first time in years!"

I stood in awe. A blackout began someone's quest for God! Two years later, our 'Mary Magdalene' came to the Savior!



When Blackouts Hit ... All Power Is Given Unto Him

Blackouts were part of life in Haiti. They often kept Radio 4VEH off the air, cut communications, interrupted schedules, and even destroyed recordings. One Saturday night, when it was time for the 11:00 news, without warning, a blackout silenced the station. Left in total darkness, I froze physically and emotionally. *"How long will it last? What should I do?"* I prayed.

Suddenly, through the control room window, there was a flicker of light: a firefly, the first I had seen in Haiti. I followed its glow, and my spirit soared. "Father, you always bring light into our dark situations!" As the praises came forth, the power came on! It was about 11:15. While getting the station back on the air, I sensed the prompting: "Put on the news." I hesitated, even arguing, "We don't air the 11:00 news at 11:15." But I obeyed the Spirit's voice.

At the close of the news, 4VEH radio director and newscaster Gaudin Charles added a special announcement. "Remember, tomorrow is Sunday, a day for worshiping our Creator. Attend the church of your choice and worship him. Don't let anything keep you from the most important part of your life, your relationship with

You Can Do This!

Judges 6:14, 16 (NIV)

"Go in the strength you have ... and I will be with you."

I grew up in a missions-minded church in Ohio, but the thought of being a missionary never occurred to me. I just figured mission work was for other people.

That all changed 30 years ago when I was studying computer science at a small Christian university. I had a professor who used cutting edge information technology to assist missions organizations. He encouraged us students to likewise use our computer skills for mission work. He would often say, "You can do this!"

I had never heard this before. No one had ever asked me personally to step out in faith and use my practical talents to further the kingdom of God, knowing he would be with me. This reminds me of when God asked Gideon to defeat the Midianites. Gideon doubted that he could do this assignment, but God gave him a great promise that he would be with him.

What about you? Have you ever thought about obeying the Great Commission with the unique skills God has given you? You can do this! God is with you! Do you know of someone who needs encouragement to be involved in missions? Tell them, "You can do this! God is with you!"

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What Is Your Left-handedness?

Judges 3:15-16 (HCSB)

Then the Israelites cried out to the Lord, and he raised up Ehud son of Gera, a left-handed Benjaminite, as a deliverer for them. The Israelites sent him with the tribute for King Eglon of Moab. Ehud made himself a double-edged sword eighteen inches long. He strapped it to his right thigh under his clothes...

Some of the biggest pushbacks to missions I hear include, "Missionaries have skills I just don't have," or "I'm not theologically trained, so I can't serve." This is where the beauty of Ehud's story comes in.

His qualification to serve God in his context was his left-handedness ... not his ability to speak, lead, build, or fight. God knew that when the enemy's guards would check Ehud for a sword, they would check the wrong leg—his left leg, not his right. This advantage proved especially important; in Ehud's time, being left-handed was not only uncommon but was actually viewed as evil.

Like Ehud, missionaries and ministers are not holier than other people or even set apart like the Levitical priests in the Old Testament. They are simply people God has called who responded with a yes, despite things, such as left-handedness, that culture says could get in their way.

What preconceived notions do you have about missions that stop you from exploring it?

How has God created you that gives you a unique way to serve him? Where is God calling you to serve him in your context?

Are Your Feet Beautiful?

Hebrews 4:14, 16

Since then we have a great high priest who has passed through the heavens, Jesus, the Son of God ... Let us then with confidence draw near to the throne of grace, that we may receive mercy and find grace to help in time of need.

That Christmas, I gave my Haitian/Bahamian friend, Joey, money to buy a calling card so he could speak to his family in the Bahamas.

Joey lived in a cardboard box next to a cement wall. On Christmas Day, Joey visited me, carrying something large and bulky under his arm. It was a stalk of sugarcane. He said, "I don't have much, but I wanted to give you something to show my gratitude and love."

I told him he did not need to give me anything because his friendship was enough.

He responded, "No, I wanted to get you something. So, with what little money I had, I bought you a stalk of sugarcane and this melon."

I didn't know what to say. His gift not only touched my heart, but it also humbled me to my core. I kept my composure and said thank you.

In a small way, I now better understand what Jesus taught his followers when he saw a widow give at the temple. He said the widow gave more than the rich people because she gave everything she had. What a challenge to me and you! May we be more like the widow and Joey, who were willing to give everything.



God's Pocket

Psalm 112:5 (NIV)

Good will come to those who are generous ...

When our thoughts turn from fear to faith, wonderful events and provisions happen. Jesus said, "It is more blessed to give than to receive" (Acts 20:35 NIV).

A little boy asked for a mission faith promise card, then wrote, "\$1.00" in the blank. He also scrawled, "My daddy will pay this."

A farmer near Winchester, Indiana, was challenged by a missionary. He dedicated a 10-acre triangle field to the Lord, promising to give all he earned to the work in Brazil. When other farmers struggled with drought that summer, this farmer's field received rain. This gave him an unusually large harvest.

We can become increasingly generous and joyful in giving, not because of what we have but because of what we discover through "God's pocket." We cannot empty God's pocket. The secret to joyful giving is understanding that God's pocket is full of available resources—not to increase our lifestyle, but to send workers who will take the love of Jesus to those for whom he died. We can access God's pocket by faith. As we prayerfully ask for his direction and take increasing steps of faith, our faith grows not only in our financal trust but also in other areas of our lives.

Ask for Nations

Psalm 2:8 (NIV)

Ask me, and I will make the nations your inheritance, the ends of the earth your possession.

God's ordained key to world evangelism is your prayer. Psalm 2, which is God's prophetic picture of how Christ will triumph over all human opposition, makes this clear ... Verse 8 gives his promise to Christ...

What is Jesus doing now? He is sitting at the right hand of the Father on heaven's throne (1 Peter 3:21-22) ... Interceding in prayer (Rom. 8:34) ...

Christ wants us to be his co-heirs and to share his throne through prayer ... Psalm 2:8 is not only God's promise to Christ, it is his promise to us. We, with Christ, inherit the nations by prayer ...

For which nations are you asking? How do you pray for a nation? First, pray for the ruler. Next, pray for pastors, missionaries, Christians in that nation. Pray for the church to grow. Ask God to use Christians' testimonies to the salvation of others. Ask God to give you souls through your prayer.

Nations are yours for the asking. People will be saved if you pray. Jesus conquers through your prayer.

You can help Jesus rule today through your prayer. Your prayer can open doors to nations, cities, homes, and hearts. Your prayer can block and restrain Satan's opposition. It can protect God's children. God plans that Jesus and we—his spiritual army—reign, win victories, and extend his kingdom by prayer.

Adopt some nation as your prayer inheritance today. Begin to ask God for that country now. Claim the promise of Psalm 2:8 for your own. Nations and the salvation of their people are yours for the asking.



Missionary Watchmen

Psalm 67:1-2

May God be gracious to us and bless us and make his face to shine upon us, that your way may be known on earth, your saving power among all nations.

You may have heard the phrase, "We are blessed to be a blessing." These words hold an important biblical truth: God's blessings are for his glory, so the nations will speak of, know, and enter into a relationship with him. Matthew 25:40 (NIV)

How clever and unforgettable. I have repeated that simple strategy countless times.

As we seek to reach family, friends, or even strangers, let's aim not to argue, even as we desire to defend our faith against a multitude of hostile and questioning people.

"I'm not an evangelist. I can't remember the last time I shared my faith," you say. But consider the many times you exhibit Christ by your deeds: you hold the door for a stranger and tell them God loves them; you bite your tongue even though a driver cuts you off in traffic; you bring a meal to a recently-hospitalized neighbor and tell them you're serving in Jesus' name. By sharing Christ in these ways, you maintain a clear conscience and leave a wide-open door for more opportunities to tell others about the love of Jesus.



Overflow

Isaiah 12:3-4 (NIV)

With joy you will draw water from the wells of salvation. In that day you will say: Give praise to the Lord, proclaim his name; make known among the nations what he has done, and proclaim that his name is exalted.

Jesus came to earth and invited us to "draw water from the wells of salvation." In John 4:14 (NIV), Jesus promised a Samaritan woman at a well, "Everyone who drinks this water will be thirsty again, but whoever drinks the water I give them will never thirst. Indeed, the water I give them will become in them a spring of water welling up to eternal life." This woman was of a despised race and confused religion, living in shame and broken relationships. May we increase in sharing Jesus' living water with others.

The Sycamore Tree

Luke 19:1-4

[Jesus] entered Jericho and was passing through. And behold, there was a man named Zacchaeus. He was a chief tax collector and was rich. And he was seeking to see who Jesus was, but on account of the crowd he could not, because he was small in stature. So he ran on ahead and climbed up into a sycamore tree to see him, for he was about to pass that way.

Many of us heard about Zacchaeus through a church song we learned as kids. It took me a while after those days of singing about "a wee little man" to recognize how significant Zacchaeus' experience really is. What I like most about this story is that, at first glance, the tree Zacchaeus climbs looks fairly insignificant. Yet, it plays an important role in his salvation! If Zacchaeus had not climbed it, he wouldn't have seen Jesus.

In contrast to the sycamore tree's perceived minor role, the large impact of COVID-19 has permeated our lives for two years now, significantly altering not only how we do life but also how we do missions. Despite these setbacks, missions hasn't stopped. Why?

Because we Christians are the sycamore trees like that of Zacchaeus' story. Small moments and little things that seem minor could actually be a branch for someone to climb and see Jesus. These little moments exist every day. We are living, breathing, walking testimonies of God's grace. Every interaction can be an opportunity for someone to meet Jesus.

Ministry looks different these days, but, as shown by the sycamore tree, seemingly small things can bring the most life-changing moments.
